I admire Bishop Michael Curry for his faith-filled being, his ministry, and his compassionate prophetic voice preaching love. His oftenquoted statement, "If it's not about love, it's not about God," is crucial to remember and inform our choice of civic leaders. Voting is a privilege I do not take for granted.

I grew up in the Philippines during the Marcos regime when bombings of opposition political leaders were normalized and openly known to be Marcos's response. No one could question him and his cronies and the corrupted government that made him and his family, loyalists, rich. I had loved ones involved in activism who were imprisoned. Martial Law was declared as he became a dictator. (Russian Navalny's death reminds me of those days.)

I was in Germany on a world tour with my chamber choir when we heard on the news Ninoy Aquino, Marcos's strongest and biggest threat, was assassinated on the tarmac of the airport. Even when a revolution ensued, the change didn't last.

In Jesus's teaching, leading is synonymous with serving, leading the people with the common good in mind. As the US, my adopted country, makes a decision that will impact not only the citizens of the US but also the world, Bishop Curry's words guide me in my civic actions. The principle of love must guide us to choose wisely who will lead and serve us as the best nation we can be.

As Christ followers and Wesleyan practitioners, our call is social holiness—to love our neighbors as we love ourselves. The good of all is the good for each of us.

There's a Facebook meme from Stephen Mattson that invites Jesus followers to ponder: "Christians should regularly ask themselves, "Is my faith more a reflection of my political, cultural, and socioeconomic values and actions, or a reflection of the values and actions of Christ?"

May our faith in God through Jesus Christ, inspired and lived out with the Holy Spirit, compel us to act and vote in love.

Stewardship Message: Don't Keep Silent

I started preaching when I was just 18 years old. I was invited by my home pastor to preach, despite my age, because he knew I had a call to the ordained ministry. By the time I was 20, I had preached a whopping three sermons. With my call and this vast amount of experience behind me, I was invited to serve a small, rural con-

gregation in Southeastern Wisconsin as their supply pastor — which basically meant I would visit the members in their homes and preach every Sunday. And so, in November of my junior year of college, I began to preach every Sunday for a congregation of 52 people. As I remember my first year there, I have fond memories of a group of faithful people who had to listen to probably the worst sermons ever given. Despite my



inexperience, the congregation was very supportive — often offering a tip or an encouraging word. Particularly, I remember one gentleman who came up to me to give me a pat on the back one Sunday morning. After a particularly difficult sermon, he said that he truly enjoyed my messages. A little surprised, I responded by simply saying, "Really?" He continued by saying, "Oh yes. You know, you stand up every Sunday and try to tell us about God's love and grace. But what I really like is that you've been preaching in the whole year; you've never mentioned money once." Considering that comment, I suppose it could be seen as a bit ironic that my ministry as a part of the Foundation is helping congregations and pastors learn how to comfortably talk about money in relation to our faith (maybe even excitedly). What I've discovered, however, is that talking about stewardship is about focusing on love and grace. It is about helping people realize all the ways we are blessed by God, that God has given to us abundantly. God has given us so much, in fact, that we have enough to give generously in love for others. I encourage you to speak about stewardship boldly. Talk about how you have experienced God's love, grace, and abundance. Share how generosity has transformed your life. Talk about the blessings others have experienced in your church made possible by your community's generosity.

Stewardship Celebration Sunday, November 24, 2024: Our fall Stewardship Appeal theme is "Celebrating Stewardship 2024." This theme points to the diverse and life-giving ministries at First Church, West Allis. It emphasizes giving to God first, trusting God to meet all our needs, and celebrating the joy of giving. The appeal ends on Stewardship Celebration Sunday, followed by a dessert reception. We will observe Stewardship Sunday by presenting our pledges and commitments during the worship service. If you will not be present on Stewardship Sunday, you can mail your pledge to the church office. Thank you for being part of this exciting and joyful congregation. Pray for our common work together as we continue to reach out with the Gospel. **Undesignated Gift Update:** During 2024, our congregation received a very generous gift from an estate in excess of \$40,000. This gift was given without any limitations. We were able to follow a policy established in 2021 for handling these types of gifts. The process has the Finance Committee asking committee chairs and staff members for places where these funds could be put to best use. The Finance Committee reviews these requests and makes a recommendation to the Administrative Council who can accept or make changes.

Recently the Administrative Council approved the money to be split to seven areas that otherwise wouldn't have had funding. The seven uses for these monies include replacing some of the worn-out Christmas trees used to beautify our sanctuary during the Advent season, replacing the broken speaker in the sanctuary, additional microphones in the sanctuary to improve the online worship experience, updating the church's phone system so the church staff can be more efficient, performing delayed maintenance on the church parking lot, conducting a building use survey to determine the best use for funds and how to make our building work better for us and the community, and helping offset the pastoral housing allowance.

These are all items that need to be done and we could have found work-arounds. These are items that aren't going to be at the top of anyone's list of "need-to-haves" but sometimes it is good to be able to get some of the "nice-to-haves."

Heidi Loomis from Oak Creek Community UMC will be the presiding elder. The agenda for the Charge Conference includes the Approval of the Membership Audit, the 2025 Church Budget (including Pastoral Compensation), the Nominations Report for 2025, Lay Preachers' Certifications, and Audit Reports.
