Chris and I landed in Savannah Hilton Head Airport and spent some days before and after the conference in Savannah. While there, we were astonished to find numerous sites commemorating John Wesley--a plaque outside the Anglican/Episcopal Christ Church and other buildings, a monument of him in

Reynolds Square, and others we missed. On Saint Simons Island, John's and Charles Wesley's historical markers were all over the island! I was geeking out! It felt like a pilgrimage to my story of faith. My faith, which keeps me going in the midst of living life filled with hard, easy, simple, and complicated times, is essential for me to be present within these times.

I understand our life together at First UMC as essential for nurturing our faith. As we go through the liturgical year from Advent to Easter to Pentecost to Transfiguration and back again to Advent, we learn our faith story grounded in the life of Jesus, a life that is alive and continuously evolving in how we see and live life as commissioned disciples called to transform the world.

We celebrated Jesus' birth, covenanted with God together as we began the new year, and reaffirmed our baptism. We remembered our vows to nurture one another and care for others inside and outside the church walls.

What a blessing that many of you have been a part of this faith community through many generations and have seen and experienced life in different stages together. It's a gift to grow with one another. Each of your faith stories informs and shapes the communal faith. This communal faith evolves as well as our community faces a different culture and needs of the nation, the state, the community, and our neighborhood. It is this evolution that gives us opportunities to understand and act on Jesus' teachings in different ways, approaches, decisions, and actions. Each one of us is a theologian and disciple equipped to change the world for goodwhere all are seen and heard and cared for.

John Wesley felt his time in Georgia was an utter failure. He didn't know how he changed the lives of the people in the colony. Maybe, like John Wesley, we won't know the impact of our discipleship, but in faith, we keep going, praying, and hoping to be a vessel of peace and love. I hope that we learn together as we pray, celebrate, and act together as agents of transformative change! That's worth geeking out on!

A NOTE FROM OUR LAY LEADER

I commented on Zechariah 14:9 at this time last year, and I will do it again this year.

The Lord will be king over the whole earth. On that day there will be one Lord, and his name the only name. (NIV)

God will be king over all the earth, one God and only one. What a Day that will be! (The Message)

It is the verse that is used for the principle of Tikkun Olam in Judaism, and studying that concept seems helpful to us in Christ's Church also.

Tikkun Olam (/tiˈkuːn ʌˈlɑːm/; Hebrew: *tikún olám*, lit. 'repairing of the world') is a concept in Judaism, which refers to various forms of action intended to repair and improve the world.

In classical rabbinic literature, the phrase referred to legal enactments intended to preserve the social order. In the *Aleinu* prayer, it refers to the eradication of idolatry. In Lurianic Kabbalah, the "repair" is mystical: to return the sparks of Divine light to their source by means of ritual performance.

In the modern era, particularly among the post-Haskalah movements, *tikkun olam has* come to refer to the pursuit of social justice or "the establishment of Godly qualities throughout the world" based on the idea that "Jews bear responsibility not only for their own moral, spiritual, and material welfare but also for the welfare of society at large."

As we head toward Lent, it seems good to me to contemplate how we, as followers of Christ, improve this world. What are we called to do? What are the forms of idolatry in our lives that we need to put aside? What do we do today to pursue Godly qualities in our lives and throughout the world? What do we do in 2025 to pursue Social Justice for the welfare of our society?

I am praying for the eradication of our modern forms of idolatry. I pray especially for each of us to be filled by the Holy Spirit.

And for each of you and for me, I pray that we live a life full of Christ's love.

Year-End Finance Summary From Richard Rinka, Finance Chair: In an attempt to keep everyone informed, I, on behalf of the Finance Committee, want to provide the congregation with a year-end summary of our finances. On Sunday, January 19th, the Chancel Choir sang "The Storm is Passing Over" for the Offertory. This seemed to fit with what I needed to say when discussing our recent financial struggles and where we are today. The lyrics from Charles Albert Tindley's are:

Courage, my soul, and let us journey on, Tho' the night is dark, it won't be very long. Thanks be to God, the morning light appears, And the storm is passing over, Hallelujah!



First United Methodist Church of West Allis finished 2024 with our expenses exceeding our income by roughly \$27,000. This may not sound particularly good, but it is promising in relation to previous years. As a comparison, in 2022, our expenses exceeded our income by more than \$87,000. You may remember that I have noted that in 2022, for every dollar spent, we collected only 80 cents (*though the night is dark*). In 2024, that increased to almost 93 cents collected per dollar spent (*thanks be to God, the morning light appears*). This isn't ideal, but it does show that we are starting to make a comeback (*and the storm is passing over*).

We all need to be thankful for past and current members who have supported our church in 2024 and throughout the years. This includes those who had the vision to create reserve funds that have allowed us to work through our recent leaner times. As a congregation we have continued to fund our church's mission and contributions to the community. Please remember that the continued funding of church programs and missions is something that the Finance Committee is committed to supporting.

The continued financial success of First Church is something that we all have a part in. We should all be thankful for everything that is happening. We look forward to sharing better news in future years. (*Hallelujah!*) Thank you for your past, present, and future support.



Stewardship Message From Joe Pitterle, Stewardship Chair: We have much to be thankful for when it comes to the generosity of our Church members! Thank you for financially supporting FUMCWA and closing the gap in our annual budget. While we are not quite to the point of covering all expenses, with income, we are getting close, the closest we have been in the past three years. This is a great reminder that stewardship is not just a campaign to run around the holidays or at specific parts of

the year. Stewardship can and should be practiced year-round! Speaking of year-round, your church committees and members work tirelessly throughout the year. In the last few years, Stewardship and Finance, with Pastor Sam and now Pastor Grace, with many volunteers, including our accounting team, worked hard to help provide a more real-time assessment of where we are financially. With this information, we can be more confident and timely with our requests moving forward. This said I believe we are at a point where we can have our incomes exceed the expenses and help secure the financial future of our church. This is crucially important for our ability to continue providing all the missions that we do. While we have reserves from years in the past, thanks to good stewardship, those will not last if we cannot reach a breakeven point here soon.

In the past, the church has had various outreaches to assist with planned giving (legacy and endowment giving) and financial well-being through workshops and small groups. I would ask any members who have ideas, requests, or questions to reach out to me regarding these topics. If there is any education we can provide that has not been offered or any questions you have, we'd love to discuss them with you. There are so many ways we can help align our own financial lives with our faith and commitment to FUMCWA. We want to reduce any barriers that may exist to help accomplish this together. Also, with tax returns on the horizon, now is a good time to see if there are any ways to maximize your giving here in 2025. Ask your accountant or your tax preparer if there are any additional ways they may see, for 2025, based on last year's return, that can help your taxes and the Church. God Bless!



2025 Lenten Book Study: This year's Congregational Lenten Book Study will focus on Adam Hamilton's book - 24 Hours That Changed the World. In this popular, heartbreaking, and inspiring book, Hamilton guides us through the last 24 hours of Jesus' life, step by step. No single event in human history has received more attention than the suffering and crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth. In this book, Hamilton will help us experience and understand the significance of Jesus' suffering and death like never before. He retraces the day that changed human history in his usual straightforward yet easy conversational style that speaks to both long-time Christians and those curious about Christ's crucifixion. This is a seven-week study with a video component. The Children's and Youth Sunday School classes will also study this book, which will follow the same study as adults (using age-appropriate lessons). Parents of Sunday School children are encouraged to join a class to enhance their children's studies and grow their faith.
